


Power Station of Art

The Power Station of Art is notable in that it is the first state-run contemporary art museum in Shanghal Launched in 2012, it is housed in a disused power station on the banks of the Huangpu River, the former location of the Pavilion of the Future in the World Expo 2010. It has been conspicuously reimagined as a Shanghai landmark, with a huge neon thermometer atop its smokestack But the Power Station is also a towering beacon in the cultural landscape of Shanghat Home to the Shanghai Biennial, it hosts prestigious international touring exhibitions. One of its first shows, Electric Fields. Surrealism and Beyond, featured 119 loaned pieces from the Centre Pompidou in Paris, and exhibitions of heavyweights such as Anay Warhol are regularly programmed. Though it is not located close to the other cultural areas of Shangha, it is well worth a visit for its free entry and seven floors of art.

Museum of Contemporary Art (MoCA) Shanghai

The Museum of Contemporary Art is a veritable greenhouse of art, a small gern of a gallery situated in the picturesque setting of the People's Park the cultural heart of the city. Founded in 2005 by the Samuel Kung Foundation, it is the first non-profit, independent gallery for contemporary art in Shanghai. Inspired by the newfound creativity and spirit of gallery for contemporary art in shanghal inspired by the newbound creativity and spirit of artistic expression in China, MoCA seeks to open a cultural dialogue between Chinese and international art and design. Exhibitions are diverse, ranging from cutting edge work from established and emerging artists, to retrospectives from the leading lights of the design word, such as Salvatore Ferragama, Chanel and Pixar, and acclaimed artists such as kusama Yayol The gallery also hosts its own blennale, MoCA Envisage, which looks at the current state and direction of Chinese contemporary art. Shanghai Gallery of Art (SGA)

The Shanghai Gallery of Art is a chic private gallery located in the historic Three on the Bund complex. Designed by acclaimed architect Michael Graves, it is a bright, 1000-square-metre space with an industrial look, high ceilings and concrete walls - a structure to contrast and complement the high-end luxury of the surrounding Bund area. First opened in 2004, SGA focuses on reclaiming Asian contemporary art and Chinese artists, showing famous artists such as Zhang Xlaogang and Gu Dexin. Known for its quality programming and interest in experimentation and interdisciplinary exhibitions, SGA also hosts prominent international artists such as Anish Kapoor and Richard Wilson.

OV Gallery

The OV (Oriental Vista) Gallery is something of an enfant terrible of the Shanghal art scene, having had two pieces censored, and a whole exhibition, the 2010 'RE-Visioning History', shut down by the local culture bureau for its critique of the official Chinese Communist Party view of history. Since it opened in 2008 under the direction of former magazine editor Rebecca Catching, OV Gallery has not shied away from pushing boundaries and tackling tough social and historical issues, albeit now in a more subtle way. The gallery demonstrates a strong focus on emerging Chinese artists, showcasing them through eclectic, but thematically strong group shows. This strategy aims to present art to a wider audience in an accessible way, creating and supporting dialogue through workshops, tours and talks.

Leo Xu Projects

Established in 2011 this young institution punches above its weight. Housed in a threestorey building hidden down a lane in the French Concession, it is one the few Shanghai galienes whose activities reach beyond its own walls. Founded by Leo Xu, a curator, photographer and writer, the gallery represents young Chinese and international artists, and has an interest in the experiences of the Chinese diaspora from around the world. Leo Xu Projects has also participated in Art Basel Frieze New York, and blennales such as Venice, Sydney and Performa in New York. Additionally, its offsite work is extensive, with projects such as Shanghai Surprise at the KH Art Malle a group exhibition inspired by the changing cultural landscape of the city, featuring young Chinese and expat authors closely affiliated with the city, and a mobile library archive.

Minsheng Art Museum

The Minsheng Art Museum was established in 2008 and is based in the Red Town Arts Precinct, With a strikingly futuristic exterior, this museum was converted from an old steel factory and comprises one main exhibition hall and four smaller halls, it is also designed as a community space, with a workshop area, café, bookshop, reading room, courtyard and offices. The museum curates quality, experimental art, and champions Shanghai-based artists. But it shines in its educational programme, which features retrospectives such as the 2018 exhibition on video art, Moving Image in China. 1988-2011.
